Roles and Responsibilities:

The TF is expected to support faculty in delivering the course. The TF's responsibilities include

- Assist in conducting and grading all assignments

Qualifications: Candidates should have completed a Master's or ASP program in Political Science or a related subject. We prefer doctoral students or recent PhD graduates.
